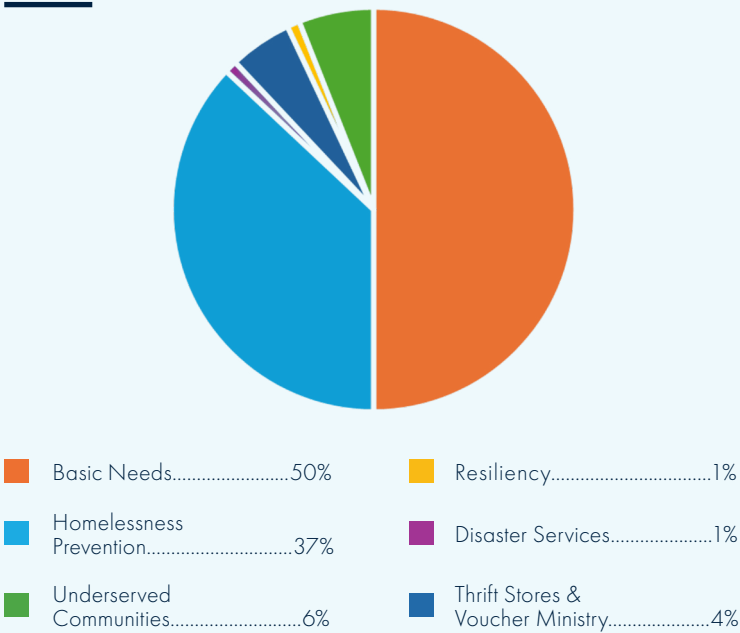

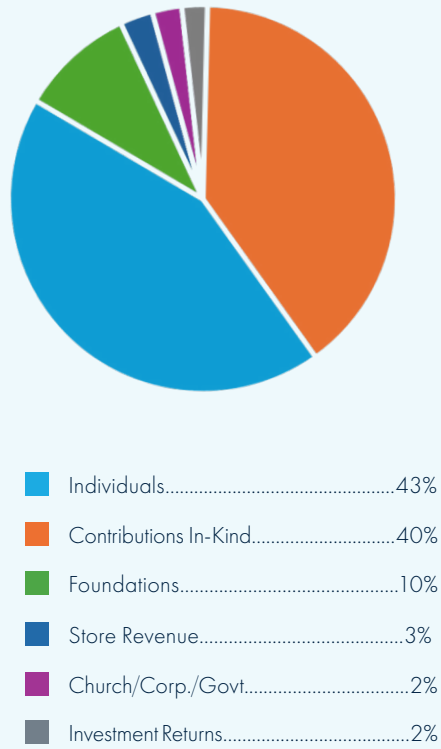

ALLOCATION OF PROGRAM EXPENSES

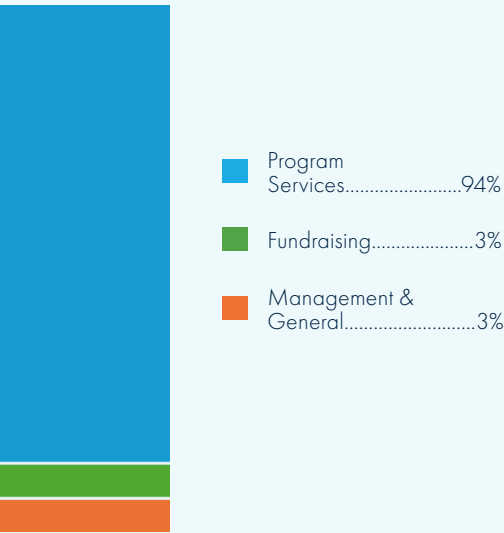


SOURCES OF FUNDS \$15 MILLION

Monya’s Journey: Hope and Stability for a Determined Mother

Monya, a single mother of two, was working fewer hours to complete her medical assistant training, which strained her finances.

After landing a stable job, she faced a new challenge: her parents had to move in when her father lost his job. Though Monya could support her kids, her income wasn’t enough for everyone.

Thanks to a grant from the Underserved Communities Initiative (UCI) and help from Vincentians at the St. Thomas Aquinas conference, her family received rent assistance. This support gave Monya’s family a chance to rebuild.

She expressed deep gratitude for the hope this help brought, “Just knowing that people are out there who care— gives hope to all of us in need.”

A Family's Resilience Through Life's Storms

When Lanette arrived at the All Saints Conference, it was the first time her family had sought assistance.

Accompanied by her daughter, she appeared hesitant, but relief washed over her when she learned they could receive \$300 for rent and food assistance. She shared their struggles: her husband had lost two weeks of income after the May Derecho storm, and again after Hurricane Beryl in July, leaving them behind on rent.

Recognizing their need, the Conference utilized special funds for Beryl survivors, covering Lanette's full September rent and half of October's. When Vincentians visited her home, they found a tidy, welcoming space—one filled with love and resilience.

Married for over 30 years, Lanette had raised five daughters, determined they would graduate high school. Life had not been easy—her youngest endured 37 surgeries, and Lanette herself faced a near-fatal medical crisis. Yet, through it all, her family stood by her.

Though asking for help was difficult, this support brought stability in their time of need.

Thanks to this aid, Lanette and her family could begin to rebuild with hope.



Transforming Life Through 'Getting Ahead'

For Cojuania Morris, a graduate of the Getting Ahead program, the experience was more than just a class—it was a turning point.

"The financial literacy course helped me break the cycle of living paycheck to paycheck," the graduate shared. "I've learned how to budget, prioritize expenses, and build a rainy-day fund." By reassessing spending habits and eliminating impulse purchases, she is now on the path to financial stability.

Beyond finances, the Getting Ahead program also provided valuable lessons in emotional wellness. "I never realized how much my tone and reactions impacted my relationships," Morris admits. "Now, I think before I speak, and I don't let frustration control my response. My overall well-being has drastically improved."

Nutrition was another area of growth. Understanding how diet affects health, she adopted healthier eating habits and became more mindful of food choices.

While Morris didn't initially seek an individual mentor, she now sees how valuable that guidance can be. "Mentorship is such an incredible asset, and I encourage future participants to take advantage of that opportunity."

Now, with a certificate from the University of Houston's Community Health Worker program, she is determined to give back. "I want to become a mentor and a Mental Health Peer Support Moderator. I believe that sharing my story can help others while continuing my own journey of growth."

While her journey isn't over, Morris is confident in the progress made. "I'm taking it one goal at a time, but Getting Ahead gave me the tools to keep moving forward."

Our Story

In 1833, Frederic Ozanam, a 20-year-old college student, and his friends began serving the poor in Paris, France. This was the beginning of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul. Today, there are more than 800,000 members serving in 155 countries around the globe.

The Society arrived in the United States in 1845, where the first conference was formed in St. Louis, Missouri. The first presence of the Society in the Galveston-Houston area was in 1871 at St. Mary's Cathedral in Galveston.

Today, there are over 50 conferences in the Galveston-Houston Council with more than 1,700 members growing spiritually through friendship and service to those in need.

A Lifeline in Crisis

Lauren, a 28-year-old Houston resident, reached out to the Vincentians at the St. Monica conference for rent assistance after losing her job over the summer. Living in a high-need community with her partner and four children, she had been the family's primary provider. However, when Hurricane Beryl uprooted a tree onto her car, she lost reliable transportation, leading to job loss and financial hardship.

Unable to cover the month's full rent, Lauren managed to pay \$1,050 but needed help with the remaining \$500. Compounding her struggles, her son was recently hospitalized, adding to the family's financial strain.

With aid from an Underserved Communities Initiative (UCI) grant, Lauren's family avoided eviction and found stability in a challenging time. Her story highlights the vital role of community assistance in preventing homelessness and easing the burdens of unexpected crises.

Now, Lauren is awaiting background check clearance for a new job, and her son is home recovering. With a path forward, their family remains hopeful and grateful for the support that helped them bridge this difficult moment.
